## **New Hall Voluntary Service – Action Groups**

When students begin their journey in the senior division of New Hall School they are invited to join one of the NHVS Action Groups appropriate to their age, which in turn gives them the opportunity to experience one-to-one contact with those in need in the community. Some students go on to build strong relationships with those whom they serve and once they are in Year 12, many of these same student volunteers become leaders of the Action Groups and then go on to take up Senior positions in the school such Head Girl and Boy. At New Hall School, we hope that this involvement will lead our students to want to remain in voluntary work throughout their adult lives.

Parents and other adults support the activities of the Action Groups in many ways and for this we are extremely grateful. Some of the groups listed below require students to leave the school premises which means they are taken to and from their destination by minibus which is driven by a volunteer driver. The drivers take great care to ensure the students' safety and all adult volunteers are closely vetted by the school.

Here are some brief details, to give you a flavour of the work they undertake.

### **Wilderness**

Students visit allotments in Chelmsford run by the Wilderness Foundation UK on a Monday lunchtime. They contribute to the community by assisting in the maintenance of allotments. The aim of the project is to establish a respect for the environment, encourage young people to grow their own organic produce and to engage with nature.

### **Shaftesbury (from Year 10)**

Shaftesbury is a lively group that meets at New Hall every Tuesday evening from 7.30-9.00pm. Students play games and spend time chatting to adults with learning difficulties. This is a very enjoyable and rewarding group.

### **Tuesday Tuck-In, Wednesday Red Cross Lunches, Barn Banquet and Friday Feast**

These four cheery groups provide lunches at New Hall School for many elderly people in the community and provide a real life-line to those who are lonely and frail. The students help to serve the lunches, prepare and clear the tables, but most importantly they sit down to share a meal and to chat with the guests.

### **Columbus (from Year 9)**

Columbus is a large enthusiastic group which visits Columbus School, a school for children with special needs. The students visit on Thursday lunchtime, spending time playing or talking with the children, or helping staff as necessary.
